BREAKOUT SESSION 1 (9:45 - 10:45 AM)

• "Roleplay with Humor" with Kathy Santen

Can we create good lesson plans and positive relations with our students from "the bottom up"? We'll start from a disastrous lesson and alienated student, and with everyone's help achieve success! Approaches such as idioms, sound contractions, and jazz chants included "free of charge" and, of course, plenty of ideas from tutor experience. Come join us!

• "Pronunciation" with Paige Zelikow

Being able to communicate effectively is a fundamental skill necessary for navigating everyday life and its many personal interactions. In this workshop, we will discuss ways of identifying our student's pronunciation weaknesses and some basic principles for teaching pronunciation. We will also focus on the "music of English" and the importance of rhythm, stress, and intonation in our patterns of speech. This workshop will also include simple, practical activities and exercises we can incorporate into our pronunciation lessons.

• "Interactive Notebooks" with Nancy Cohen

- "Maintaining Student Motivation" with Paige Zelikow
 In this workshop, Paige will present techniques for helping students
 set and stay focused on their English learning objectives and
 recognize their accomplishments. We will discuss goal setting,
 drivers of persistence, motivational techniques, and ways to support
 student engagement.
- "Goal Setting with Low-Level Learners" with Steven Reid When starting to work with a Low-Level English Language Learner, many tutors are uncertain about setting realistic goals. How much are we expected to accomplish in a year? What are the most important skills to learn? Where do I start? It can seem an overwhelming task.

This workshop will focus on those questions and provide a checklist of skills and a set of activities aimed at helping tutors with low-level students set the goals needed to help move their students forward.

BREAKOUT SESSION 3 (12:50 - 1:50 PM)

• "Better Health from Better Health Literacy" with Lydia Witman, UVA Medical Center

You and your students all must navigate the complicated world of American healthcare and health insurance, which requires many different skills. A person's level of ability to obtain, process, and understand basic health information and services is called that person's "health literacy" level. Having a non-English primary language or a lower educational level are both risk factors for low health literacy. In this session, learn some techniques to help your students, and you, stay healthy, with better health literacy.

• "Know Your Rights" with Frank Sullivan, Sin Barreras

Sin Barreras is a small Charlottesville-based non-profit that focuses on outreach to the immigrant (primarily Hispanic) community, connecting individuals to services. This workshop will focus on explaining the rights of immigrants living in our community and what they should say or do when interacting with law enforcement officials.

• "Integrated Education and Training" with Steven Reid

A new component to adult education is "Integrated Education and Training." Combining language acquisition with work force preparation can speed up the learning curve for students newly arrived in the US. LVCA has identified two area where we can work to help our students earn industry-, state-, and federally-recognized certificates to improve their job prospects and earning potential. The ServSafe ® program will help students in the food service industry gain the knowledge and skills necessary for food-handler safety, while the Rise Up ® program will help people gain customer service skills necessary for a variety of occupations.
