










Online Teaching Strategies-Palooza

Activity Ideas:

<p>PHOTO OF THE WEEK</p> 	<p>Tutor and learner send each other a photo from the week.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Talk about each other's photos to practice conversation. • Work on new vocabulary words based on the photos. Tutor can intentionally take photos that incorporate vocabulary words from prior lessons or to preview vocabulary related to this lesson. • Work on grammar such as past tense verbs or identifying count nouns vs. noncount nouns. • Write sentences about the photos. • Explore culture through the pictures: Holidays, common activities, etc.
<p>Same/Different</p> 	<p>Share a pair of pictures. Have the student identify what is the same and what is different.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ask/answer questions about similarities & differences (and in this example, foods we like/dislike...) • Work on prepositional phrases (in this example: in the pan, on the table). You could pair pictures that share or differ in prepositional phrases. • Work on new vocabulary words based on the photos • Pair items from the US and their country of origin to explore cultural similarities and differences
<p>HOUSEHOLD SCAVENGER HUNT</p> 	<p>Take a few pictures around your home (or neighborhood) that have a theme (letter sound, shape/color, usage, rhyming words, etc.) to share as a set.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ask your student to identify the theme and ask/answer questions about the pictures • Work on sounds that are common across pictures and/or can be spelled with different letter combinations • Ask your student to take pictures of things that fit a theme (i.e. "things that have a 'oo' sound")
<p>Mini-Video Outings</p> 	<p>Take a short video while you are on an outing and send it to your student (at the post office, at the grocery store, taking a walk, getting the mail...)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Write a short story describing your outing or a one or two sentence summary of your outing • Talk about similarities and differences between how this function is done in the US and their country of origin, or between your home/store and your student's. • Work on verb tenses, such as yesterday I went to..., today I am going to ..., tomorrow I will go to...

	<p>Designate question prompts for each number on a dice, and identify a reading or photo/video that will serve as the text for the activity.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Work on reading comprehension by rolling a dice and asking your student a question that goes with that number, orally or in writing (“I rolled a 1. Who went to the doctor’s office?”) • Work on conversation and question words by having your student generate a question that goes with the dice number rolled.
	<p>Use the wheelofnames.com website to customize a wheel you can spin.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Put question words into the wheel to utilize the same approaches as “Dice Questions” • Put different time cues into the wheel to practice verb tense (i.e. yesterday, tomorrow...) • Use different sentence starters to practice conversation and/or writing • Place images into the wheel instead of words to practice vocabulary
	<p>Use quizlet.com to find or create online flashcard sets for your student to practice vocabulary.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • You can share the link with your student so they can practice on their own and/or on their phone • There are flashcard, multiple choice and matching activities
	<p>Use Google Docs to create shared documents.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • You can create and share sentence frames, substitution dialogues • You can create “dueling sentences” with sentence pairs where one is correct and one has errors. • You can share the link to the google doc with your student so your student can type into it also. • You and your student can create a DIY Picture Dictionary – go to <i>Insert</i>, select <i>Images</i>, select <i>Search the Web</i>, then in the pop-up box, type in the key word and choose an image to insert
	<p>Online activities you can do together over screen sharing.</p> <p>For example:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Vocabulary: drag and drop picture vocabulary from http://eflnet.com/vocab/picturevocab.php • Health-related vocabulary, reading, listening, reading comprehension activities at http://www.reepworld.org/englishpractice/health/index.htm • Vocabulary bingo at https://bogglesworldesl.com/bingocards.htm
